# 128Kx36 Flow-Through SRAM with NoBL™ Architecture

## Functional Description

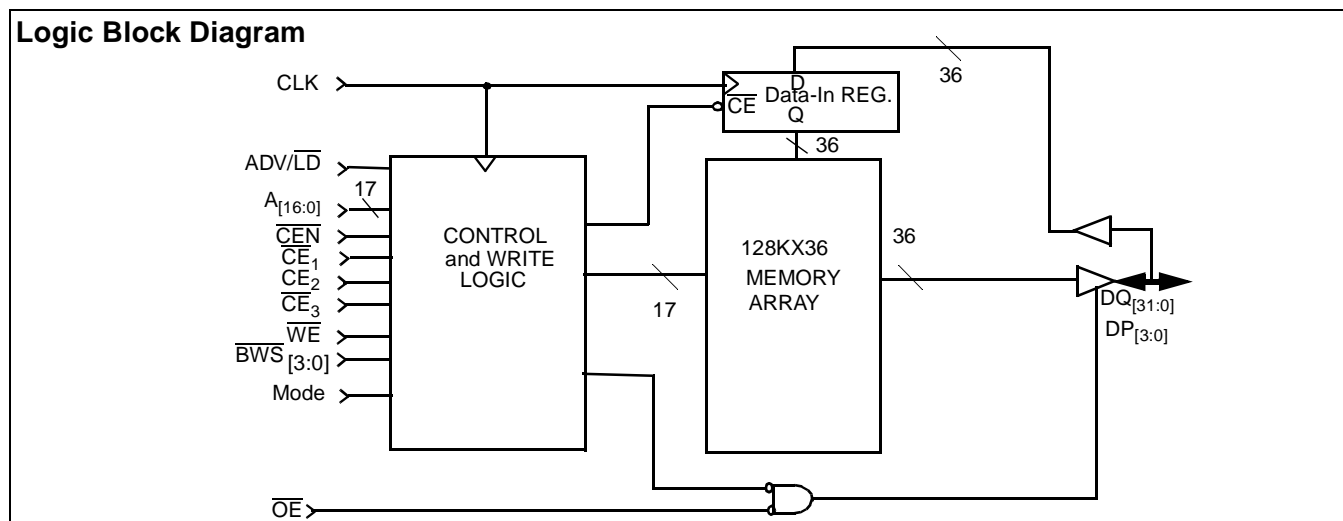
The CY7C1351 is a 3.3V, 128K by 36 Synchronous Flow-Through Burst SRAM designed specifically to support unlimited true back-to-back Read/Write operations without the insertion of wait states. The CY7C1351 is equipped with the advanced No Bus Latency™ (NoBL™) logic required to enable consecutive Read/Write operations with data being transferred on every clock cycle. This feature dramatically improves the throughput of data through the SRAM, especially in systems that require frequent Write/Read transitions. The CY7C1351 is pin/functionally compatible to ZBT SRAMs IDT71V547, MT55L128L36F, and MCM63Z737.

All synchronous inputs pass through input registers controlled by the rising edge of the clock. The clock input is qualified by the Clock Enable ( $\overline{CEN}$ ) signal, which when deasserted suspends operation and extends the previous clock cycle. Maximum access delay from the clock rise is 11.0 ns (66-MHz device).

Write operations are controlled by the four Byte Write Select ( $BWS_{[3:0]}$ ) and a Write Enable ( $\overline{WE}$ ) input. All writes are conducted with on-chip synchronous self-timed write circuitry.

Three synchronous Chip Enables ( $\overline{CE}_1$ ,  $\overline{CE}_2$ ,  $\overline{CE}_3$ ) and an asynchronous Output Enable ( $\overline{OE}$ ) provide for easy bank selection and output three-state control. In order to avoid bus contention, the output drivers are synchronously three-stated during the data portion of a write sequence.

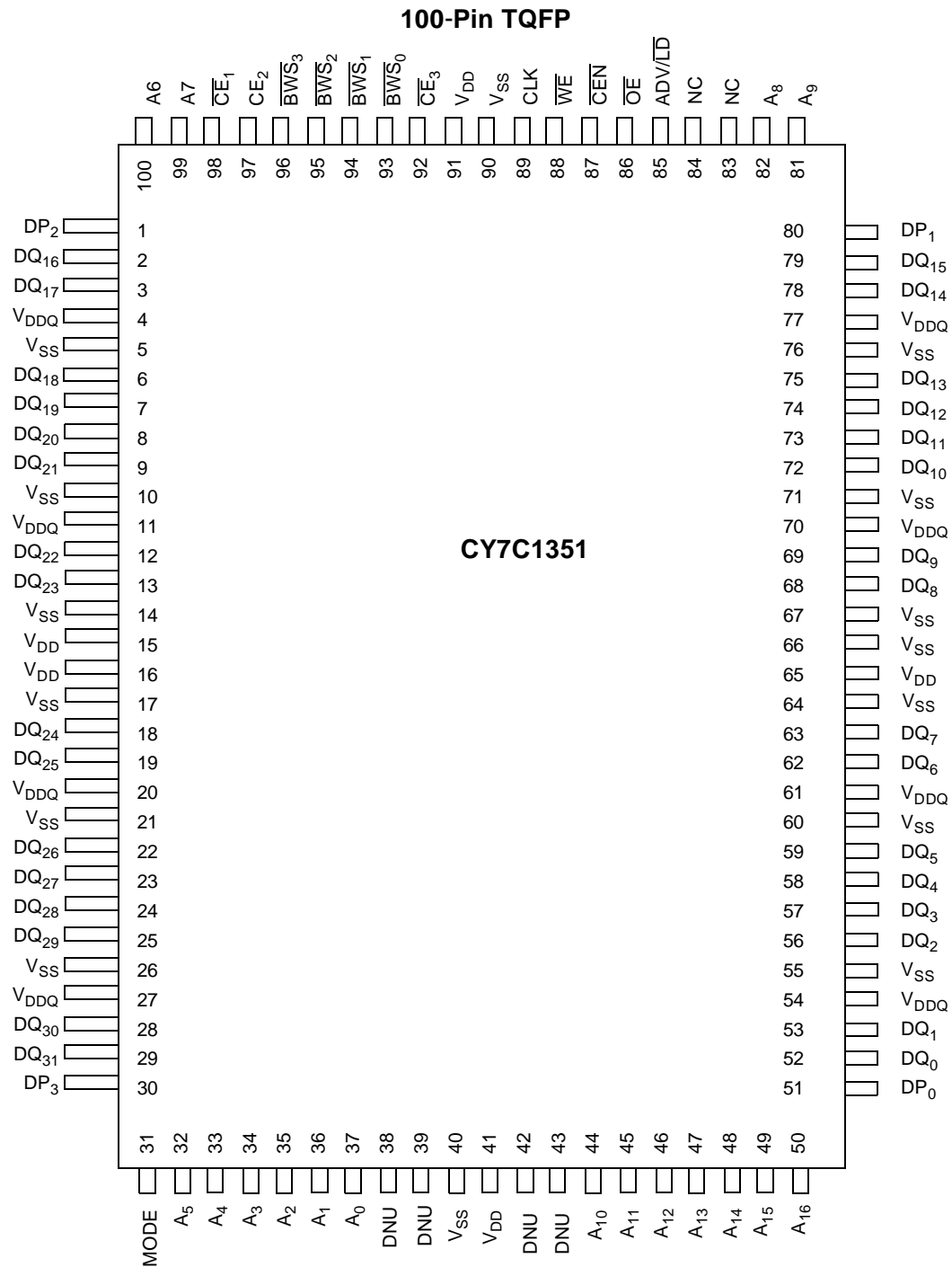
## Logic Block Diagram

## Introduction

### Functional Overview

The CY7C1351 is a Synchronous Flow-Through Burst SRAM designed specifically to eliminate wait states during Write-Read transitions. All synchronous inputs pass through input registers controlled by the rising edge of the clock. The clock signal is qualified with the Clock Enable input signal ( $\overline{CEN}$ ). If  $\overline{CEN}$  is HIGH, the clock signal is not recognized and all internal states are maintained. All synchronous operations are qualified with  $\overline{CEN}$ . Maximum access delay from the clock rise ( $t_{CDV}$ ) is 11.0 ns (66-MHz device).

Accesses can be initiated by asserting all three Chip Enables ( $\overline{CE}_1$ ,  $\overline{CE}_2$ ,  $\overline{CE}_3$ ) active at the rising edge of the clock. If Clock Enable ( $\overline{CEN}$ ) is active LOW and  $\overline{ADV/LD}$  is asserted LOW, the address presented to the device will be latched. The access can either be a Read or Write operation, depending on the status of the Write Enable ( $\overline{WE}$ ).  $\overline{BWS}_{[3:0]}$  can be used to conduct byte write operations.

Write operations are qualified by the Write Enable ( $\overline{WE}$ ). All writes are simplified with on-chip synchronous self-timed write circuitry.

Three synchronous Chip Enables ( $\overline{CE}_1$ ,  $\overline{CE}_2$ ,  $\overline{CE}_3$ ) and an asynchronous Output Enable ( $\overline{OE}$ ) simplify depth expansion. All operations (Reads, Writes, and Deselects) are pipelined.  $\overline{ADV/LD}$  should be driven LOW once the device has been deselected in order to load a new address for the next operation.

### Single Read Accesses

A read access is initiated when the following conditions are satisfied at clock rise: (1)  $\overline{CEN}$  is asserted LOW, (2)  $\overline{CE}_1$ ,  $\overline{CE}_2$  and  $\overline{CE}_3$  are ALL asserted active, (3) the Write Enable input signal  $\overline{WE}$  is deasserted HIGH, and 4)  $\overline{ADV/LD}$  is asserted LOW. The address presented to the address inputs ( $A_0$ – $A_{16}$ ) is latched into the Address Register and presented to the memory core and control logic. The control logic determines that a read access is in progress and allows the requested data to propagate to the output buffers. The data is available within 11.0 ns (66-MHz device) provided  $\overline{OE}$  is active LOW. After the first clock of the read access the output buffers are controlled by  $\overline{OE}$  and the internal control logic.  $\overline{OE}$  must be driven LOW in order for the device to drive out the requested data. On the subsequent clock, another operation (Read/Write/Deselect) can be initiated. When the SRAM is deselected at clock rise by one of the chip enable signals, its output will three-stated immediately.

### Burst Read Accesses

The CY7C1351 has an on-chip burst counter that allows the user the ability to supply a single address and conduct up to four Reads without reasserting the address inputs.  $\overline{ADV/LD}$  must be driven LOW in order to load a new address into the SRAM, as described in the Single Read Access section above. The sequence of the burst counter is determined by the MODE

input signal. A LOW input on MODE selects a linear burst mode, a HIGH selects an interleaved burst sequence. Both burst counters use  $A_0$  and  $A_1$  in the burst sequence, and will wrap around when incremented sufficiently. A HIGH input on  $\overline{ADV/LD}$  will increment the internal burst counter regardless of the state of chip enables inputs or  $\overline{WE}$ .  $\overline{WE}$  is latched at the beginning of a burst cycle. Therefore, the type of access (Read or Write) is maintained throughout the burst sequence.

### Single Write Accesses

Write access are initiated when the following conditions are satisfied at clock rise: (1)  $\overline{CEN}$  is asserted LOW, (2)  $\overline{CE}_1$ ,  $\overline{CE}_2$ , and  $\overline{CE}_3$  are ALL asserted active, and (3) the write signal  $\overline{WE}$  is asserted LOW. The address presented to  $A_0$ – $A_{16}$  is loaded into the Address Register. The write signals are latched into the Control Logic block. The data lines are automatically three-stated regardless of the state of the  $\overline{OE}$  input signal. This allows the external logic to present the data on  $DQ_{[31:0]}$  and  $DP_{[3:0]}$ .

On the next clock rise the data presented to  $DQ_{[31:0]}$  and  $DP_{[3:0]}$  (or a subset for byte write operations, see Write Cycle Description table for details) inputs is latched into the device and the write is complete. Additional accesses (Read/Write/Deselect) can be initiated on this cycle.

The data written during the Write operation is controlled by  $\overline{BWS}_{[3:0]}$  signals. The CY7C1351 provides byte write capability that is described in the Write Cycle Description table. Asserting the Write Enable input ( $\overline{WE}$ ) with the selected Byte Write Select ( $\overline{BWS}_{[3:0]}$ ) input will selectively write to only the desired bytes. Bytes not selected during a byte write operation will remain unaltered. A synchronous self-timed write mechanism has been provided to simplify the write operations. Byte write capability has been included in order to greatly simplify Read/Modify/Write sequences, which can be reduced to simple byte write operations.

Because the CY7C1351 is a common I/O device, Data should not be driven into the device while the outputs are active. The Output Enable ( $\overline{OE}$ ) can be deasserted HIGH before presenting data to the  $DQ_{[31:0]}$  and  $DP_{[3:0]}$  inputs. Doing so will three-state the output drivers. As a safety precaution,  $DQ_{[31:0]}$  and  $DP_{[3:0]}$  are automatically three-stated during the data portion of a write cycle, regardless of the state of  $\overline{OE}$ .

### Burst Write Accesses

The CY7C1351 has an on-chip burst counter that allows the user the ability to supply a single address and conduct up to four Write operations without reasserting the address inputs.  $\overline{ADV/LD}$  must be driven LOW in order to load the initial address, as described in the Single Write Access section above. When  $\overline{ADV/LD}$  is driven HIGH on the subsequent clock rise, the chip enables ( $\overline{CE}_1$ ,  $\overline{CE}_2$ , and  $\overline{CE}_3$ ) and  $\overline{WE}$  inputs are ignored and the burst counter is incremented. The correct  $\overline{BWS}_{[3:0]}$  inputs must be driven in each cycle of the burst write in order to write the correct bytes of data.

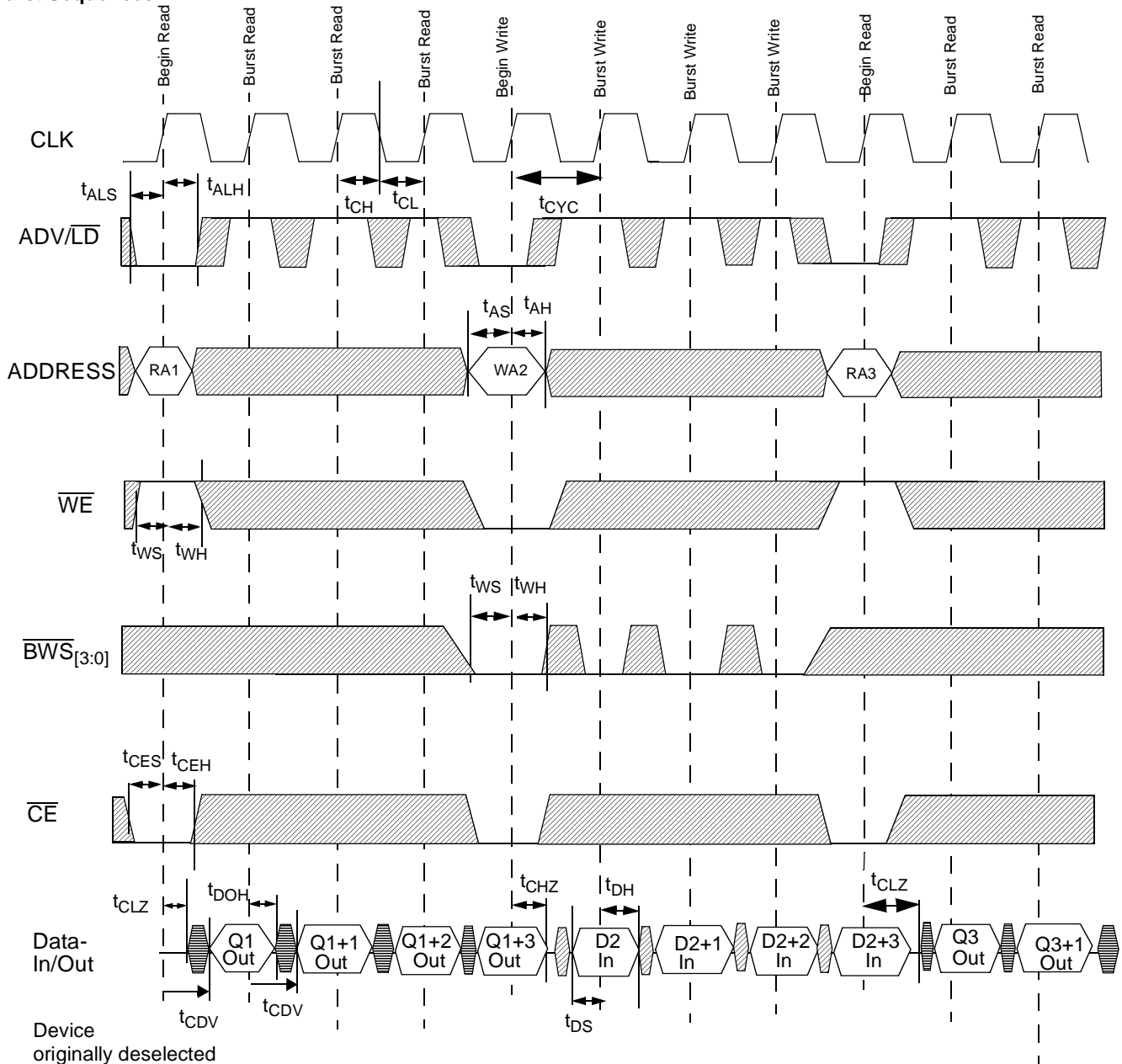

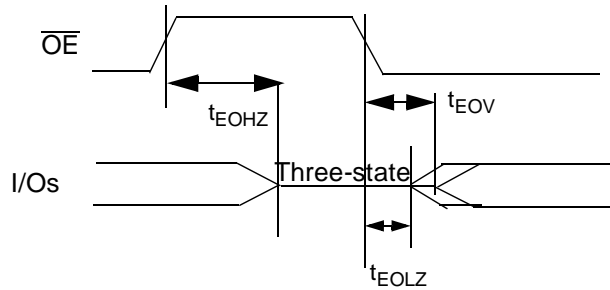

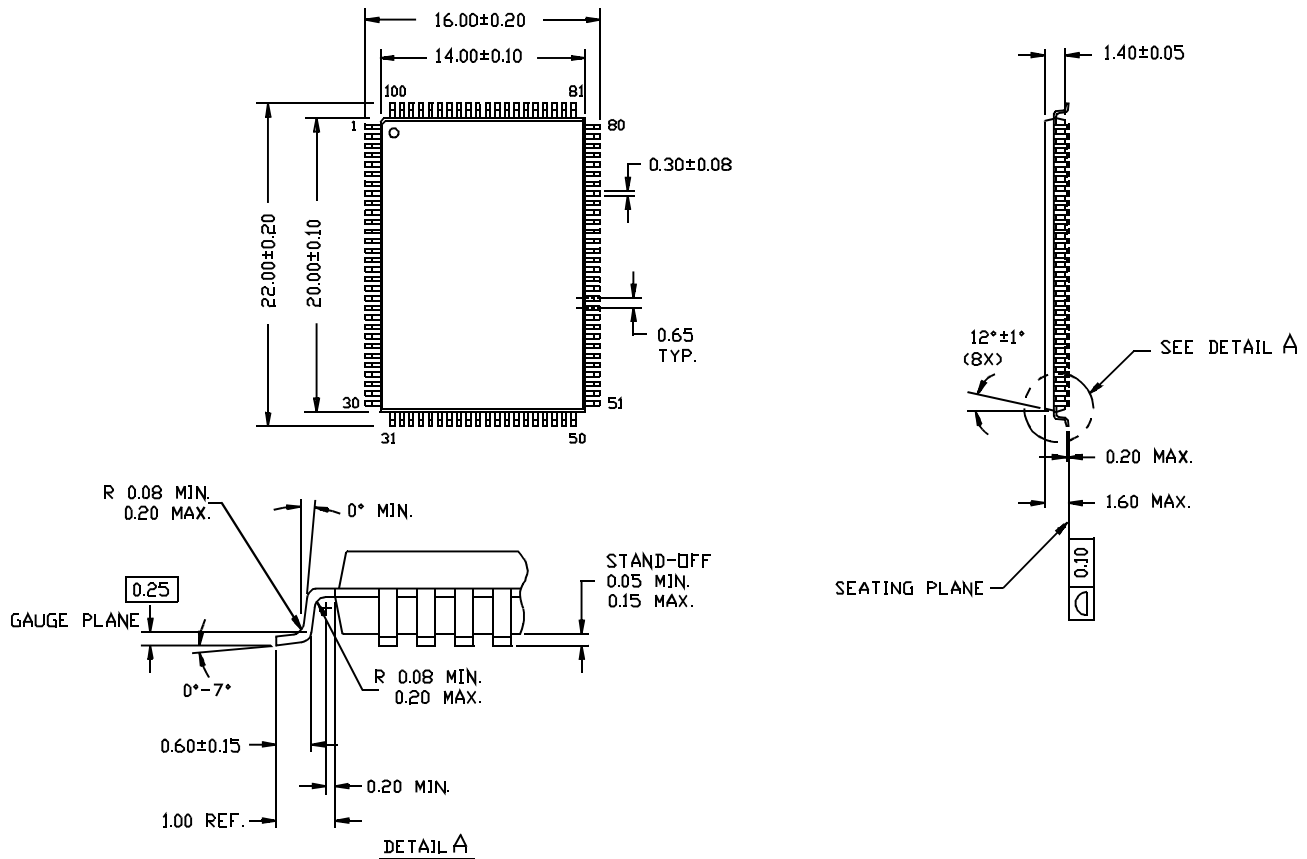
